Wellness Graduation Requirement

Alcohol Education & Prevention – WELL 085 Wellness Graduation Requirement

The University of Richmond requires all first year and transfer students to complete a comprehensive alcohol education and prevention program during their first semester on campus. Successful completion of the requirement is mandatory for graduation from the University. In order to successfully complete the WELL 085 requirement, you will need to complete the following steps:

Step 1: Complete Alcohol Edu. You must earn a grade of 70% or higher to pass and receive credit. **The deadline for completing Part 1 is August 18, 2010. Failure to complete Part 1 will result in a registration hold being placed on your account (this will prevent you from making changes to your class schedule).**

Step 2: Register and attend a section of WELL 085 – Alcohol Education & Prevention Workshop. You must have successfully completed Alcohol Edu before you can attend the alcohol education and prevention workshop.
